FROM THE RABBI

RABBI JODIE GORDON

"It is a tree of life for those who hold fast to it." (Proverbs 3:18)

I've been thinking a lot lately about the power of this metaphor. The proverbial voice reminds us that Torah is a life-giving force: with deep roots and strong, endless branches, it enlivens all who cling to it. It's a beautiful image to be sure: when I picture it, I see the stories of those first human families of Genesis as our roots. The tree grows upward, with the stories of Exodus and of our hard-won freedom as the sturdy trunk of our tree, the years of wandering B'midbar, in the wilderness as our branches as our story evolves and reaches forward toward the laws and the stories of Leviticus and Deuteronomy.

It was this image I had in mind last month, when I had the honor of attending a very special gathering at Temple Emanu-EI in New York, organized by the Memorial Scrolls Trust based in London. For over thirty years, Hevreh of Southern Berkshire has been the guarantor of a Sefer Torah as part of the Memorial Scrolls Trust. Our Torah, Scroll#759 is one of over 1500 Torah scrolls that were recovered after World War II, having been taken by the Nazis for use in a museum that they planned to call the "Museum of an Extinct Race." Our scroll comes originally from a town called Rychnov nad Kněžnou, which is a small town, about 150km away from Prague. What we know about our Torah scroll only scratches at the surface of the stories of that Jewish community in Rychnov nad Kněžnou.

The event at Temple Emanu-El was one of the largest gatherings of Czech Torah scrolls in the fifty years of the Memorial Scrolls Trust existence, and truly, it was a remarkable reunion. The event was created to celebrate the opening of a new museum exhibit on Torah yads (pointers); what better way to celebrate than with a collection of Torahs? Hevreh member Michael Shocket was instrumental in coordinating Hevreh's participation in this event. He is currently working on a very special documentary for Hevreh about our particular scroll and I am most grateful to him for his enthusiasm and dedication to the project.

Of the original cache of scrolls (1500+ Torahs), over 1000 are in North America today, with the rest having found homes in more than 25 different Jewish communities around the world. The gathering at Temple Emanu-El was for all of the communities in the Northeast who have these Torah scrolls, and the event organizers were amazed by the response of more than seventy communities which committed to coming and bringing their Torah for the processional. As the director of the Trust, Jeffrey Ohrenstein noted, it was the first time these scrolls, which all come from Bohemia & Moravia (now the Czech Republic) had been together in the seventy years since they were rescued after the war. The collation of these scrolls together was a remarkable sight: each one a little different, garbed in their special ceremonial covers, some quite large, others quite small. As I watched the processional of these Torahs carried lovingly by each community, I thought of the generations of Jews before us who had carried these scrolls- and especially of the Jews of Rychnov nad Kněžnou, who probably would never have imagined that one day their own Torah would bring Jewish learning alive in Great Barrington, MA. Our community should feel quite proud of the love and effort we have put into ensuring that our Torah, scroll #759 remains kosher and usable; we are one of a minority in that we read from this Torah each and every week, and that every student who becomes Bar/Bat Mitzvah here reads from it as well.

Torah, is truly a tree of life to those who hold it fast. This is not just a metaphor. As we continue to bring it to life, I would encourage all who are interested to learn more about our particular Torah's roots, by visiting www.memorialscrollstrust.org Fondly,

SING IT! GUEST SERMON FROM REV. ERIK KARAS

6:15pm

Rev. Erik Karas is the Pastor and Rector of Christ Trinity Church in Sheffield. Christ Trinity is a combined Episcopal and Lutheran congregation. This combined congregation is an excellent fit for Erik as he has spent many of his 20 years in ministry involved in both ecumenical and interfaith partnerships. Prior to serving in Sheffield, Erik served a combined church in Augusta, Maine where he worked closely with the neighboring synagogue particularly in the area of refugee welcoming, care and advocacy as more and more Iragi and Syrian refugees moved to Augusta.

Prior to the ministry, Pastor Erik was a food scientist and worked for The Coca-Cola Company where he was known as "Dr. Slurpee" for his product development work in frozen beverages. Pastor Erik lives in Sheffield with his wife Kelly who is a JetBlue flight attendant. Their oldest daughter is currently teaching English in South Korea and their younger daughter is a junior at the University of Maine, majoring in Social Work.

The sermon is entitled Sing It! It uses Hannah's Song from 1 Samuel 2: 1-10 as the text and it explores the idea that the world around us has a "soundtrack" which is all too often a dark, disempowering and disheartening song. That song plays in our heads and hearts almost unconsciously, but it affects how we live in the world. Hannah, coming out of the Temple, chose to sing a different song! She sang it right out loud into the face of that darkness. And it turns out that her song of life and light is more powerful than the world's song of darkness for one key reason.



VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

My introduction to Hevreh came in the early

1980's, when I spent a couple of summers in a group house in the Berkshires, coming up almost every weekend from New York City, where I lived at the time. Over the years some of the friends I made moved here full time, and others bought weekend homes. This allowed me to return to this wonderful

area frequently while still in NYC, and then as a vacation destination as I moved around the country. Over the years, I would find myself being drawn to Hevreh, and tried to attend services when I visited the area. When my husband and I decided that this was our "retirement" choice, one

of my rabbis in Dallas said, "you have to check out Hevreh...it's the best!" I told her I already knew that and was pretty sure that Hevreh would become my new spiritual home. And so it has! From the friendliness of members when I first started attending services, to joining the choir, Rosh Chodesh, and participating in other ways, it has always felt like the right place for me, both spiritually and personally. I joined the board several years ago and now have become one of the four vice presidents.

Moving forward, each vice president is responsible for oversight of various committees and projects. My responsibilities include Rosh Chodesh (of which I have been chair for some years, so that's easy!), Ritual Committee and our Social Action Committee

A commitment to social action and social justice runs deep within me – whether being socially conscious at a job, synagogue, or with various groups to which I have belonged.

Two years ago, soon after the election of our current president, I attended my first Consultation on Conscience in Washington, DC, with about a dozen other Hevreh members and with eight hundred others from around the country. This is sponsored by the URJ's Religious Action Center and was an amazing, motivating experience. It made all of us feel like we were

not helpless and that even small efforts could make a difference. Delegates from Massachusetts got together while in DC and worked on criminal justice reform in our state – the first steps have made a difference. We heard from several senators and representatives, who were

inspiring, and had the opportunity to go to Capital Hill to meet with our congress people.

Consultation on Conscience is happening again this May. Currently we have ten Hevreh members going, and would love to share it with more of you. There are also workshops and activities for teens – it is never too early to learn and begin your own fight for justice! If you are interested, whether teen or adult, please seek me out and I would be glad to talk to you about going.

We are already thinking of how to do more in our community and I'm sure we will come back with lots of ideas for projects, talks, etc. If you have any passions and ideas in any area of social justice, I would love to hear from you. All are welcome to take part in this important aspect of life at Hevreh.

LIBRARY NEWS

For, lo, the winter is past the rain is over and gone;
The flowers appear on the earth, the time of singing is come

Song of Solomon

The sun is shining, wild geese are headed north, the crocuses have bloomed — Spring is upon us. Get out your candle and feather, rid your home of chametz, and prepare for Pesach.

We have some extraordinary picture Haggadot as well as booklets for family and friends to use at the Seder table. You can check these out at the Hevreh Library and return them when you are done.

First, there is the newly acquired treasure by Edgar M. Bronfman, *The Bronfman Haggadah*, a large format book full of amazing watercolor paintings created especially for this book by artist Jan Aronson, Bronfman's wife. Edgar M. Bronfman is a renowned philanthropist and Jewish leader, who supports "initiatives that inspire a renaissance in Jewish life." His philosophy is woven throughout the pages of the Haggadah, which is filled with meaningful readings, quotations and poetry by well-known and lesser-known writers and philosophers. The illustrations, some representational, some abstract, but all equally stunning, highlight the rituals and story of the Exodus from Egypt that we retell generation after generation.

One example: the opening of the door for Elijah is accompanied by a small and simple painting of an open door, revealing glowing candles on a table inside. On the other hand, the Ten Plagues are revealed in a two-page abstract spread of monochrome blues and geometric shapes.

Here is a sample of one of Bronfman's ideas included in the text, following the Ten Commandments: "The Hebrew words for 'freedom', *cherut*, and for 'engraved', *Charut*, are linguistically similar and are linked in the tradition. This suggests that there can be no freedom without moral and ethical laws, the kind of stark and universal principles engraved in stone and revealed to the Israelites in the burning wilderness of Sinai."

And then, with the pause in the story for the Passover meal, we get an illustration of clusters of grapes—an abundant, joyful image of fruition and wholeness.

The second large format Haggadah we are featuring is *An Israel Haggadah for Passover* adapted by Meyer Levin. (Bonus: We have smaller versions of this Haggadah that you can also check out for use at your Seder.) The 70 illustrations, including 58 in full color, highlight Springtime in Israel, with awe-inspiring photographs of the mountains, sky and desert, as well as joyful pictures of children with chicks, closeups of birds, fruit and blossoms. Families from many places are featured at their Seders in the section, "A Portfolio of Israeli Seders"— a Jerusalem family, Jews from Kurdistan, a kibbutz Seder with children marching around the tables holding greens, to name a few.

The Preface explains that "this Haggadah is presented not in disagreement with tradition, but to restore to our Passover observance something of its earlier tradition of spontaneity, of connection to current life, and hence to universal freedom efforts. It is called an 'Israel' Haggadah because such a renewed and enlivened tradition has already come into being in Israel, particularly in the kibbutz movement where a variety of texts is in use." This collection of words, images and music truly emphasizes this point!

And so we conclude this survey with words of freedom by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, quoted in *The Bronfman Haggadah*:

May you enjoy freedom of speech May you enjoy freedom of worship May you enjoy freedom from want May you enjoy freedom from fear

Let freedom ring! Chag Sameach to all. The Library Committee meets on the third Thursday of the month, 11:00 am. All are welcome.


